

Professor Graham Ellis is the Deputy Chief Medical Officer for Scotland and a national leader in transforming care for older people, community services, and unscheduled care. A consultant geriatrician by background, he has been pivotal in developing and scaling Hospital at Home and wider virtual capacity—programmes that have fundamentally reshaped how primary and community specialist services work together to support people safely at home.

He was founder and first President of the UK Hospital at Home Society in 2020. Graham is an Honorary Professor at Glasgow Caledonian University with a substantial research portfolio and long-standing collaboration with Healthcare Improvement Scotland on frailty, quality improvement, and community-based acute care. He brings extensive experience in evidence, implementation, and practical service change.
